PHI4333 Philosophy of Mind

#### Course description

This course introduces the contemporary philosophy of mind. By following closely the new findings in cognitive science and neuroscience, this field has become one of the fastest growing fields in contemporary philosophy. We will start with the classical issue of mind-body problem, then move to the more recent field of consciousness studies. Finally, we will look into some on-going debates on emotion and intentionality.
