Course overview

Socrates: "...that the really important thing is not to live, but to live well." (Plato: Crito 48b) Since Socrates the problems of what a good life is and how to live it have been the key issues in Western philosophy. This seminar will be a philosophical reflection on the meaning of good life, morality and happiness based on closed reading of the texts on Socrates, Platonic dialogues and works of Aristotle. Students are expected to study the original text intensively and to participate in discussion.

Learning outcomes

- 1. Identify and articulate some major problems and issues in the history of Western Philosophy.
- 2. Demonstrate a solid grasp of the issues discussed.
- 3. Analyze and critically interpret some historical significant texts in Western philosophy.
- 4. Demonstrate an enhanced ability to conduct independent research on the topics covered and related issues.
