The course examines selected topics in Anglo-American philosophy. The specific content of the course varies from semester to semester. Offerings with different subtitles can be taken up for credit, up to a maximum of two times.

- 1. Understand the key concepts, major issues, and prominent positions in the selected topics.
- 2. Critically discuss and evaluate the major issues and positions in the topics.
- 3. Demonstrate familiarity with the primary/secondary source texts.
- 4. Demonstrate skills in argumentative discussion and in philosophical writing.
- 5. Demonstrate ability to articulate and defend one's own philosophical theses with clarity.
