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I. Course Overview and Learning Outcome

This is a seminar course devoted to examining the issue of "Language and Interpretation" developed in philosophical hermeneutical tradition such as in the philosophy of Heidegger and that of Gadamer. The objectives of the course are to help students in 1) gaining competence in explaining and evaluating the key concepts of the theory of language and interpretation in Heidegger and Gadamer; 2) demonstrating familiarity with the primary and secondary sources texts of the field; 3) engaging in in-depth discussion on the selected topics of the course; 4) demonstrating ability and skills in articulating and defending one's own philosophical argumentation with clarity, etc..

II. Course Requirement and Grading

- 1) students are expected to participate the seminar discussions actively; to read in advance the assigned readings and other related materials; to present your findings on the assigned topics (1-2 times) to the teacher and other participants of the seminar.
- 2) A research paper on the selected topic based on your readings and thinking about the issues discussion in the seminar.
- 3) Grades for the presentations are 30%; research paper 60% and participation 10%
