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Course overview :

課程簡介： 本課程主要研討柏拉圖對話錄(dialogue)經典之一，《理想國》(*Republic*)。《理想國》篇章，究其本源，更應稱之為《治國》(*Politeia*)。「理想國」之用語，語意較為廣泛模糊，反而容易使讀者誤以為柏拉圖的主旨，只在於提倡一種非現實的政體，高呼某類烏有鄉之幻想。實情是，透過反覆論辯何謂「公正」(**justice**)的要義，欲求得治理城邦(Polis)的政治法理。再者，柏拉圖更希望指出，把握「公正」的理則，不單是為了將抽象法則應用於維持社會的政治秩序，「公正」亦是一種引導人類心靈(**psyche**)達致圓滿的重要品德(**virtue**)。換言之，無論城邦的治理抑或心靈的整合，「公正」的形式均貫穿其間，恰如一鏡像反映，產生無盡的交替共鳴。此外，《治國》篇還談及「洞穴比喻」，太陽與「善之理念」的玄妙類比。這些論題一方面，正是構成「柏拉圖式」形上學和知識學說的根基；另一方面，它們對於與城邦治理的探討相互並行的倫理學說，更提供了進一步的解釋理據。

This course examines the major problems and issues in Plato's philosophy through a close reading on his major texts. The major focus is directing to the selected texts, *Republic* (and may be some extracts from other dialogues).

And, this is an undergraduate seminar course devoted to reading and interpreting selected works in Western philosophy and discussing the interpretive and philosophical issues raised by the text.

[Advisory to Majors: to be taken in year 2 or above.]

Learning outcomes

1. Understand the historical and cultural background of the philosophical classic selected for reading.

2. Read and interpret the texts, to analyze the content, to identify philosophical issues addressed, and to evaluate the arguments.
3. Acquire a critical view on the doctrines put forward in the texts.
4. Demonstrate an enhanced ability to research independently on the issues taught.

Topics may include :

1. 柏拉圖的哲學問題，其哲學與政治的關係，對話（dialogue）與辯證（dialectic）；柏拉圖與柏拉圖主義（Platonism）
2. 公正（justice），城邦（polis），法律，德性（virtue），正義，幸福（happiness）
3. 心靈（psyche /soul），理型/相（eidos），知識（episteme），洞穴比喻，善之理念（idea of the good）
4. 哲王（philosopher king），政治體制，開放社會（open society），極權主義（totalitarianism）

Learning activities

In this course, you are expected to

- read and think about the assigned readings
- develop the skills mentioned in the course outcomes through philosophical discussion and writing (short essays, final essays, and presentation, comment report of tutorial readings)
- attend *all* lectures/tutorials and participate in discussion

Activities and workload:

In-class (mandatory) :

1. Lecture: 2 hours for every week (2/ 2.5 hours for the first two or three weeks).
2. Interactive tutorial: one 1-hour session every week starting from week 3 or 4.
3. Presentation and comment on the required readings.

Out-of-class (average workload per week) :

1. Reading: 2–3 hours on the required and suggested readings, 4–5 hours on tutorial reading assignments and presentation.
2. Essays: an average of 2–3 hours each week on reading the texts and preparing the essay throughout the semester.
