UGEA 2110B – Introduction to Chinese Culture Term 2, 2019

Course Overview

This course is an introduction to the culture of China. Specifically, we will examine what is meant by the word culture and how such an understanding influenced the development of Chinese civilization from its beginning through the pre-modern period. In order to provide as comprehensive an overview as possible, each week's lecture will cover a different component of China's cultural heritage. With this knowledge in hand, you will be able to appreciate how Chinese culture has survived and developed over so many centuries and why its preservation is necessary for the continued enrichment of human civilization.

- 2. Broaden your historical understanding of Chinese culture.
- 3. Appreciate the role Chinese culture still plays in modern society.
