**Course overview:**

This course examines the issues of human death from the philosophical as well as cultural, social and psychological perspectives. Students will develop an interdisciplinary perspective in the fields of philosophy, sociology, psychology, cultural studies, and medical science by understand how these studies have responded to key questions concerning death and immortality. Topics to be discussed include: What is the definition of life and death? What is the nature and badness of death? Should we choose for immortality? The practical issues related to death such as suicide, euthanasia, anti-natalism, human extinction, and the meaning of life will be discussed as well.

**Learning outcomes:**

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

- cite the major arguments in the current philosophical debates over the issues of death;
- recount the historical, scientific, social and cultural contexts of the debate;
- discuss the broad range of practical issues about life and death;
- form a conclusion about their own view on death and defend it with a strong, logical reasoning.

**Learning activities and workload:**

- 1. Lecture:** 3 hours each week.
- 2. Class Discussion:** Students are required to discuss reading material assigned in class.
