Phil 5310/7310 – Seminar on Pre-Modern Chinese Philosophy: The School of Names Term 2, 2020

Course Overview

This seminar discusses the texts and thinkers of the School of Names (*mingjia* 名家) in ancient China. We will read the texts by Deng Xi 鄧析, Yin Wen 尹文, Gongsun Long 公孫龍, and Hui Shi 惠施, and look examples of sophistry in the *Daodejing*, *Zhuangzi*, *Mozi*, and *Xunzi*. By investigating the key arguments of these thinkers and seeing how they contribute to the development of argumentative thinking in ancient China, we will see that a sophisticated philosophy of language existed in Chinese antiquity that was comparable to or even surpassed that of the Greeks.

Learning Outcomes

- 1. Become familiar with texts and arguments of the School of Names.
- 2. Broaden your historical understanding of Chinese philosophy.
- 3. Appreciate the creative uses of language and ideas by thinkers outside of this School.

Class Presentation:

You will give one presentation lasting 30 minutes based on a reading of your choice. The purpose of the presentation is to highlight the things you find most interesting about the text and to lead the class in discussion. The presentation will be worth 25 points of your final grade.

Research Paper:

You will write one term paper, in English, on any topic related to philosophy of language in ancient China. Comparative papers are allowed. The paper is due on our final lecture. The format is double-spaced, 12 pt. Times New Roman font. Include a separate cover page containing the title of your paper, your name and student number, the course code, and date of submission. You must cite any and all material that is not of your own creation. The minimum length of each paper is 12 pages, not including the title page and bibliography. The term paper is worth 50 points of your final grade.
