PHIL 5512 Moral and Political Philosophy: Good and Right

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Contents: This course will focus on the following issues in Second Term, 2020-2021:

(1) **Practical Ethics**: The Problem of Abortion

- The subject matter of ethics is practical ethics. Therefore, we will start off with the most perplexing of all issues in practical ethics, namely the problem of abortion.
- (2) Normative Ethics: Consequentialism, Deontology, and Contractualism
 - How do we determine whether an act is morally right or wrong? Normative
 ethics is the study of theories that attempt to set standards of rightness in
 action, policy, or law. We shall study theories in consequentialism, deontology,
 contractualism and (if time permits) virtue ethics.
- (3) Metaethics: Moral Anti-Realism and Realism
 - What is the nature of our moral judgments? Can they be objectively right or wrong? Or are they merely subjective? We will study Moral Anti-Realism and Moral Realism.
