# UGEA 2110B – Introduction to Chinese Culture Term 2, 2020

### **Course Overview**

This course is an introduction to the culture of China. Specifically, we will examine what is meant by the word culture and how such an understanding influenced the development of Chinese civilization from its beginning through the pre-modern period. In order to provide as comprehensive an overview as possible, each week's lecture will cover a different component of China's cultural heritage. With this knowledge in hand, you will be able to appreciate how Chinese culture has survived and developed over so many centuries and why its preservation is necessary for the continued enrichment of human civilization.

- 1. Identify the main characteristics of Chinese culture.
- 2. Broaden your historical understanding of Chinese culture.
- 3. Appreciate the role Chinese culture still plays in modern society.

## Reading Summaries:

You are asked to write a short summary (100 words) of five assigned readings. You should not copy-and-paste the content of the text but summarize its key points in your own words. Each summary is to be emailed to me on the days given in the lecture schedule below. The subject of your email must be written: Your Full Name\_UGEA2110\_SumX (where X is the summary number). Each summary is worth 6 points, for a total of 30 points of your final grade.

#### Exam:

We will have a three-hour exam covering the entire course (all lectures and readings) and you will be asked to write three short essays of approximately 750 words each (you will have a choice of questions and I will provide example questions ahead of time). The exam will be held during the official examination period. Complete instructions will be issued in our final lecture. Each answer will be worth 20 points, for a total of 60 points of your final grade. Exams will not be returned.
