PHIL5070 / 7070 Seminar on Chinese Philosophy

Course Outline

Course overview

This is a postgraduate seminar course devoted to three of the earliest surviving commentaries to the *Daodejing*: the Xiang'er, Heshang Gong, and Wang Bi. Through a close and comparative reading of these commentaries, we will find that Laozi's text was open to radically different interpretation having very different applications to everyday life and our understanding of the world.

Learning outcomes

- 1. Demonstrate familiarity with the primary and secondary source texts on the syllabus.
- 2. Gain competence in explaining and evaluating the key concepts and theories addressed in the course.
- 3. Be able to articulate and defend a philosophical thesis of their own concerning the issues discussed in the course
- 4. Demonstrate progress in their papers toward mastering the expository and critical skills for argumentative writing.

The Daodejing and its early commentaries

To master the *Daodejing* and its early commentaries.

To become more deeply acquainted with Daoist philosophy.

Refining one's skill at researching and writing a long research paper
