In this course we will explore the topics of fundamentality and metaphysical dependence. These topics are of great interest, since many scientific, religious, and philosophical views presuppose that there is metaphysical structure, whereby some goings-on are fundamental, and some are not; and where the non-fundamental goings-on metaphysically depend, one way or another, on fundamental goings-on. In the first session, I'll motivate the topic, and present my preferred 'Fundamentality First' approach to metaphysical structure, coupling a primitivist account of fundamentality with a pluralist account of metaphysical dependence. In the second session, we'll consider some skeptical approaches to metaphysical structure, due to John Heil and Justin Clarke-Doane. In the third session, we'll consider Karen Bennett's pluralist 'building-based' approach to metaphysical structure. In the fourth session, we'll consider Jonathan Schaffer's and Michael Raven's 'grounding-based' approaches to metaphysical structure. I am writing a book titled Fundamentality and Metaphysical Dependence, so some of the recommended readings will involve chapter drafts of this manuscript. I'm looking forward to your input!
